LeMoyne-Owen College has chosen four (4) metrics to measure student achievement:

- Total Course Completion
- Course Completion by Major
- Capstone Course Completion
- Six-Year Graduation Rate

Course Completion Rates are an Important Indicator for student success. The completion rate is simply the percentage of students enrolled in a course at the census date who receive credit for it. The inverse is often referred to as the DFW rate, or the percentage of students who receive a failing grade (D/F) or withdraw from the course (W). Courses with very high DFW rates or large numbers of students who do not complete then become priorities for increased investment, support, and redesign. Institutional DFW rates typically range from 15%-30%, meaning that students are currently sitting in (and paying for) a class for which they will not receive credit. Failing (or even withdrawing from) a class can result in several negative outcomes for a student:

- Less likely to be retained
- Longer time to degree (and therefore higher cost of degree)
- Potential to lose financial aid if course load drops below full-time status
- Potential to lose scholarship if GPA drops below minimum

LeMoyne-Owen College (LOC) is focused on course completion. The College emphasizes helping students get into the right course and complete it. From placement processes to prerequisites to visits to the advisor, the components of matriculation are designed to assist students with being in the right class. Once the student is in the class, LOC provides tutoring services, supplemental instruction, office hours, and other instructional support options that help facilitate success in the course. Minimum qualifications, hiring practices, and evaluations ensure the most qualified and effective instructor teaches the class. Degree and certificate completion are achieved only after students complete courses.

The GOAL for the Course Completion of LOC is to meet or exceed the baseline average by 10 percentage points over the 3-year period.

The College annually monitors total Course Completion Rate as a measure of the success of its undergraduate programs.

The Course Completion Rate by Majors has risen in all but seven of the majors from Fall 2018 to Fall 2020. Only two (2) majors were below the Acceptability Rate in the Fall 2020 semester as opposed to eight (8) majors in the Fall 2018 semester.

The GOAL for the Course Completion Rates by Majors at LOC was 90% over the 3-year period.

The College annually monitors the **Course Completion Rates by Majors** as a measure of the success of its undergraduate programs.

Minimum Acceptability Rate for Achieving Student Success at LOC: 75%

3. Capstone Course Completion

A capstone course is an LOC degree requirement that allows students to demonstrate their cumulative knowledge in their major. The concept can go by different names at other institutions, including senior thesis, final exhibition, culmination project, capstone experience, and more. However, what it involves is generally similar.

The definition of a capstone course can vary depending on the student's major. Some focus on students completing a final paper that showcases their understanding. Others may require the creation of a portfolio or a presentation that the student will have to give to graduate. In some instances, capstone courses involve internships, volunteer hours, or other kinds of work experience.

However, every capstone method concentrates on a central idea: giving students a chance to demonstrate their expertise and skills in a subject. Since knowledge in different majors may have to be expressed in different ways, that leads to the variation in the definition.

The total **Overall Capstone Completion Rate** at LOC has increased from 92% in the Fall 2018 semester to 95% in the Fall 2020 semester.

The GOAL for the Overall Capstone Course Completion Rate at LOC was 100% over the 3-year period.


The College annually monitors **Overall Capstone Course Completion Rate** as a measure of the success of its undergraduate programs.

Minimum Acceptability Rate for Achieving Student Success at LOC: 90%

4. Six-Year Graduation Rate (IPEDS)

The six-year graduation rate represents students who enrolled as first-time, full-time students six years earlier and completed their undergraduate degrees within 150% of the traditional 4-year time frame. The six-year graduation rate is a federal reporting standard. The six-year graduation rates at LOC have risen from 12% in 2018 to 15% in 2020.

The GOALS for the Six-Year Graduation Rate at LOC are to meet or exceed the baseline average of 12% by two (2) percentage points per year over a three-year period.




